COMMUNITY RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT DIVISION

The Community Research and Development Division announces its first Graduate Student Paper Competition to be held during the 2004 annual meeting. The goal is to encourage scholastic endeavors which enhance our understanding of issues affecting the community. Relevant paper topics can focus on various aspects of the community including its capacity (i.e., social capital), development, design, empowerment, renewal, well-being. Conventional qualitative and quantitative empirical analyses are welcome, as are evaluations of the effectiveness of community-based programs. To be eligible a paper must not be published or accepted for publication. Papers that have been presented at a professional meeting, submitted for presentation at a professional conference, or are under review for publication are eligible. Papers must be student-authored. They may be single-authored by the student or co-authored by more than one student, but may not be co-authored by a faculty member or other non-student. Papers must not exceed 30 pages including all notes, references and tables. Send two copies of the paper and a cover letter specifying that the paper is to be considered in the Community Research and Development Division Graduate Student Paper Competition to: Dr. Michael E. The winner will be announced at the SSSP Annual Meeting in August 2004 and will receive a \$100 cash award.

CONFLICT, SOCIAL ACTION, AND CHANGE DIVISION

CRIME AND JUVENILE DELINQUENCY DIVISION

The Crime and Juvenile Delinquency Division announces its 2004 Graduate Student Paper Competition. Papers may be empirical or theoretical, and they may be on any aspect of crime, deviance, and/or social control. To be eligible, a paper must have been written during 2003, and it may not be published, accepted for publication, or under review for publication. Papers which have been presented at a professional meeting or accepted for presentation at a professional meeting are eligible. Papers must be student-authored; they can be single-authored or co-authored by students, but may not be co-authored with a faculty member or other non student. There is a 25-page limit, including all notes, references, and tables. The winner will be announced in Spring 2004, will receive a \$300 stipend, and will be invited to present the paper at a regular Division panel session at the 2004 SSSP Annual Meeting.

DRINKING AND DRUGS DIVISION

The Drinking and Drugs Division is holding its 2004 Student Paper Competition. First place winner will receive a \$100 prize and be recognized at the 2004 meeting of the Society for the Study of Social Problems. The division reserves the right to identify additional prizes or to not award a first place winner at its discretion. Papers must present original research (empirical and/or theoretical) related to drinking and/or drugs from a social problems perspective. To be eligible, participants must be currently enrolled in a graduate degree program and have not yet received a Ph.D., J.D., or M.D. degree at the time of submission. Participants must have had primary responsibility for preparation of the paper. All entries must be endorsed by a sponsor who is a current (2004) member of the division. EDUCATIONAL PROBLEMS DIVISION

All graduate students are encouraged to apply for the SSSP Educational Problems Division annual paper award competition. The paper should be associated with the specific interests of the Division, namely, those social problems within the broad area of education. The submitted paper should not exceed 30 double-spaced pages and should be prepared for anonymous review. The author's name, contact information and institutional affiliation should appear on a separate page at the beginning of the paper, along with an abstract of 150 to 200 words. All references to the identity of the author within the text should be removed. Current graduate students, and recent graduates who received their degrees after January 2004, may submit a paper if it was written while still a student. Papers based on theses or dissertations are acceptable. DO NOT SUBMIT THE THESIS OR DISSERTATION ITSELF. Co-authored papers are acceptable as long as all the listed authors are current graduate students. Double submissions to other SSSP award competitions will be disqualified. ENVIRONMENT AND TECHNOLOGY DIVISION

The Environment and Technology Division is pleased to announce its 2004 Graduate Student Paper Competition. Papers may be theoretical and/or empirical and may be on a topic relevant to environment and technology, including environmental movements, technology and risk, political economy and the environment, or environmental justice, among others. The winner will receive a monetary award plus payment of the winner's SSSP membership fee for the 2004 SSSP meeting to help the winner attend the meeting. The winner will also be offered the opportunity to present this paper at one of the Environment and Technology sessions being held at the 2004 SSSP meetings.
