I am pleased to submit the report of my third year as Editor of *Social Problems*. I want to express my gratitude for the support that I have received as Editor. I also want to thank Laura Bannon and her staff at Oxford University Press for their support.

This report documents the journal's activities from June 1, 2016-May 31, 2017.

Editorial Office

Heading into my last year as editor and my final editorial report, I want to thank all those who have worked with me on this journal: associate editors, editorial board members, and student editorial board members. I also want to acknowledge the production editor, Amy Jo Woodruff, and the consultant who assisted the social media committee to learn how to write press releases and develop a social media presence, Erika Hobbs. I'm particularly grateful to staff members who have worked so closely with me throughout this time, Maira E. Álvarez (Managing Editor) and Devon E. Jones (Assistant Editor). They have been exceptional. The work of Maria Luna Duarte, a student board member, and Monica Pérez-Segovia, an editorial board member, has provided Spanish translation of the online abstracts of published articles, beginning with Volume 62, Number 2 of *Social Problems*. I also want to acknowledge the journal's Social Media Committee (co-chairs Kasey Henricks and Devon Goss). The collective effort of these members has allowed us to sustain the quality of the journal and I believe we accomplished some good things and hopefully enhanced the journal's outreach to the public.

Associate Editors

Nine associate editors provided substantive and methodological expertise: Professors Sharon Collins, Heather Dalmage, David Embrick, Roberto Gonzalez, Moon Kie Jung, Rogelio Saenz, Amanda Baumle, and Maria Monserud. These Associate Editors also provided quick turnaround reviews (i.e., occasionally needed when a reviewer fails to submit a review) and addressed conflicts of interest and discrepancies in reviews.

Advisory Board

The editorial board included 70 colleagues who provided expertise in a variety of areas of specialization and methodology significant to *Social Problems*. The board also included 11 international scholars. Advisory board members agreed to review four manuscripts per year, recommended potential reviewers, resolved discrepancies in reviews, and promoted *Social Problems* through their social networks. In some cases, board members generously provided quick turn-around reviews for papers and I am grateful.

Two new editorial board members have been added to the board, Kasey Henricks and Claudia López. As Kasey begins his tenure track position at the University of Tennessee and Claudia begins her position at California State University-Long Beach, they have transitioned from the student editorial board to the editorial board of the journal.

Student Advisory Board

The student advisory board consists of 20 graduate students with students who are solely engaged in the review process and a Social Media Committee that consists of 6 graduate students. Kasey Henricks and Devon Goss serve as Co-Chairpersons of the Social Media Committee. The student board now represents 15 universities that include Bowling Green State University, University of California-Santa Cruz, University of Connecticut, George Mason University, University of Georgia, University of Illinois-Chicago, Louisiana State University, Michigan State University, University of Nebraska, University of New Mexico, Northeastern University, University of Oklahoma, Rice University, Vanderbilt University, and University of Utah. These students summarize the comments of external reviewers and help to recommend potential reviewers for manuscripts.

Summary & Submission Processing

The number of original manuscripts submitted is similar to last year. Notable is the relative consistency of the numbers with a slight increase in time to deflect and a decrease in the average time to reject. The Impact Factor is 1.684 (up from 1.29) locating the journal as 36/143 among sociology journals [the 5 year Impact Factor is 2.595].



Also noted are the areas of submission as demonstrated by the 24 codes. The coding chart illustrates the distribution of submissions across categories, with Race & Ethnicity (11%) and Crime and Deviance (10%) having the highest submissions, and Health, Immigration, Law & Society, Poverty, Class and Inequality, Work & Economy, and Education showing the largest numbers of submissions (each 6%).

Submissions from International authors are similar to last year with the largest submissions coming from Australia, Canada, Israel, Germany, Norway, the Netherlands and the United Kingdom. This is consistent with past years. Despite the Spanish translations of published abstracts (online), we still do not see an increase in the number of submissions from Central or Latin America.

Social Media Committee

The Social Media Committee has supported authors to receive media attention and professional recognition. A separate annual report has been submitted by the Committee that provides a detailed explanation of how and why particular metrics are used. In addition, Oxford Publisher is now combining the exceptional vodcasts produced by the Committee with our featured articles. It is our hope that these can be used to support instruction.

Budget

This year a request was made and supported to supplement the May issue to include essays by colleagues on the state of the discipline. Because of a transition in staff and unforeseen delays in the production process, additional funds were requested to expedite production. These delays have now been addressed and the journal is operating within budget at this time.

Summary

I look forward to this next year as Editor. In taking this role my goal was to enhance the breadth of submissions, broaden the outreach of the journal, and promote an editorial board and submission process that reflected the diversity of the field in all of its varied aspects. To achieve these goals, online Spanish abstracts were provided, a social media committee was created and great care was taken to generate a diverse editorial board. Clearly, some efforts were more successful than others.

In addition, an exceptional staff has helped to produce a 100+ pg editorial manual. This manual includes job descriptions of staff, along with a student orientation guide and templates for use or modification by future editors. We hope it is useful.
