The survey ran for two weeks from October 1 through October 15 and was available to all current SSSP members. Response rates and geographic distributions of responses are shown on the next page.




### SSSP 2019 Membership Survey Response Statistics and Distribution

### How long have you been a member of SSSP?







#### What is your primary employment type or affiliation?







Text Entry

Too much bias in organization. Michelle has too much influence and does not allow the voices of other people.

I was very disappointed with how the BDS vote was handled. It certainly felt like an institutional and ethic betrayal for an organization with supposed justice aims to treat Palestinian rights and solidarity like a moral question rather than a moral imperative. The voting proxy process also seemed structured to deliberately undermine a fair vote.

Very poor leadership from Michele.

Membership is extremely expensive (almost as expensive as ASA membership) yet I get very few benefits from membership. The divisions that I am a part of rarely communicate with members; they haven't even run award competitions for papers or books published by nongraduate student members. The one benefit of SSSP membership seems to be the subscription to Social Problems, but that journal has been mismanaged in recent years, and I don't find myself reading it much anymore. Thus, this will likely be my last year in SSSP.















### Engaging in social justice research and action





#### Interacting with a network of peers









#### Professional opportunities





#### Receiving the journal





#### Receiving mentoring in field of interest





#### Volunteering for a committee or elected position



# You said that SSSP does not effectively engages in social justice research and action. Please tell us how we can improve.

#### Text Entry

Research, yes, we do this, but we do not consider divergent views of economic causation. For action, what action has SSSP ever taken toward bringing about social justice? If you count little statements sent to Washington, I guess so. But I would not count those (or that of encouraging letter writing). "We SSSP stand firmly against X and protest Y... blah, blah, blah." In short, we are a highly ineffective and irrelevant organization--and I've been a duespaying member since my student days in the 1960s.

SSSP seems to be more focused on the "study of social problems" as its name suggests than on the "solving of social problems." I would like to see more action research. I thought the process by which two members could bring forward an anti-social justice resolution (on BDS) in August and move it towards a vote with opportunities for limited discussion on the amendment itself but no actual opportunities for broader member engagement on the issue and problems therein really make SSSP a questionable space in terms of its supportiveness of all its members and of social justice. If the resolution vote had turned out differently I do not know if I would have stayed involved with SSSP and I definitely would not recommend the organization to others.

I believe the organization could do a much better job at assisting faculty and researchers with translating their work into real policy implications.



For example, I think it is unconscionable that all SSSP members cannot vote on meeting resolutions, rather you have to be present at the business meeting in order to do so. This effectively punished any member who cannot attend the Annual Meeting or the business meeting (given the overlap with ASA, ABS, and other related meetings). Many other professional associations have supported BDS resolutions and SSSP is behind the curve here.

The members do the research. I am not aware of any research sponsored by SSSP.









#### Did you vote in the last general election?





# Did you vote in any of the division elections in the last three years?





### Are you aware of volunteer opportunities with the SSSP?





# If you are a professional member, were you a student member previously?







As a older white male, I realize I have little vulnerability to harassment. But, of all the professional associations I belong to SSSP is -- by far -- the one most committed to preventing inequalities and harassment on multiple dimensions of "diversity."

I am concerned about the bylaws for voting. I attended the meeting during which resolutions were voted on. I participated in voting for resolutions and I underrated that the SSSP allows members to vote by email/ by proxy and I feel this is not democratic, as those who feel strongly about issues to be voted on, they will attend. Otherwise perhaps if someone is unable to attend the chair of the meeting should be notified in advance rather than any member can receive the email anytime during the meeting. This opens the chances for undemocratic practices. I am also concerned with the proposed changes to how resolutions can pass in the future, i.e. rather than majority it will require two third of the voters for it to pass.

Problems with accessibility with check-in and check-out process, had to be moved to different room when finally checked in as first room REEKED of mold and mildew, including wads of grey mildew growing in air conditioner vent in room. Only reason we got successfully moved as that supervisor of front desk happened to be there when I went down to complain. Second room had mold in bathroom and mildew growing on wall behind bed headboards, but too exhausted to go through the process of having to move yet again. My biggest concern about SSSP is a worry about the status of SOCIAL PROBLEMS maintaining its very high status as a refereed peer-reviewed journal. I have heard about the difficulty the society has had in recruiting good candidates for editor and I worry about the journal moving away from the rigorously double-blind reviewed model and toward a more "curated" approach reflecting the specific interests of current editors. The strength of the journal is vital to maintain, even if SSSP has to put resources IN to it (rather than the historic tendency for the journal to be a huge money maker)..

I think the society lacks a focus on health disparities.

One of the survey questions asked whether SSSP does social justice action and research. The question should have been separated into two. I do think the society does the research, I do not think it does the action. That is why I answered neutral.

"Talked down to" as if I were a child by a male member of SSSP when standing in line at hotel lobby to check-out, pompous ass.

More attention to scholarship and research. Less obsession with peripheral issues of "inclusion." More tolerance of opinion on the political right, in order to provide more meaningful critique and challenge.. We are always preaching to the choir. That's fine but it doesn't bring any new participants into the discussion.

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### Text Entry, continued.

Some of the answer choices on the race-ethnicity question were not mutually exclusive, yet there was no option to select more than one choice.

It was disappointing, at the national meeting, that people infiltrated the organization to shut down a resolution related to supporting Palestinian sociologists and not supporting Israeli institutions that actively discriminate against Palestinians. The only reason this resolution was voted down was by virtue of a co-opting of the meeting discussion of this resolution and utilizing proxy votes of people who were not truly affiliated with the association for any reason other than shutting down the resolution. Further, the detractors only joined based on the "controversial" authors of the resolution being on the radar of right-wing media watchdogs. Something should be done.

I checked that I have been ogled, catcalled, and made uncomfortable. I have never experienced it in SSSP. It is usually in the hotel or in the city area that I encounter those experiences. Those are things I don't believe SSSP can control necessarily.

I first joined SSSP about 50 years ago and was very organizationally active for some decades. Now, I am slowing down and turning more attention to political activism
