Christopher P. Dum (Ph.D., University at Albany) is an associate professor at Kent State University in the department of sociology. His research uses qualitative methods, as well as experimental survey research to examine the effects of mass incarceration and sex offense policy. Specifically, Dr. Dum's work examines how individuals with criminal and sex offense histories are received by the community. His book, *Exiled in America: Life on the Margins in a Residential Motel* (2016, Columbia University Press) uses ethnographic methods, while his other work has been published in *Journal of Experimental Criminology*, *Criminology and Public Policy*, and *Sex Abuse: A Journal of Research and Treatment*. Currently, he is studying ways to reduce the stigma applied to formerly incarcerated individuals.



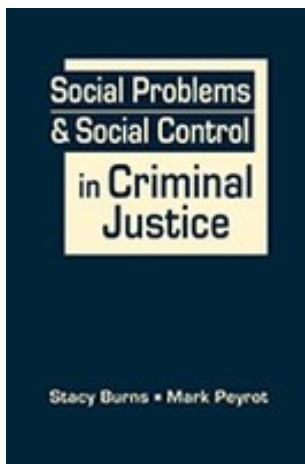
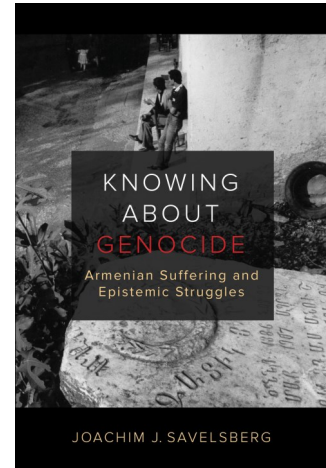

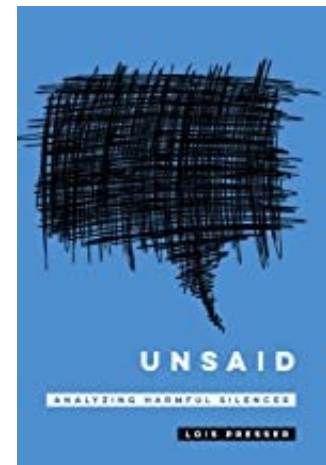
