Professor Carpiano is Associate Professor of Sociology at the University of British Columbia.

He has served SSSP on the review committees for the Greenley Award and chaired the student paper competition for the last several years. He is an active member of the division and a thoughtful contributor

at the annual business meetings. His primary interests are in the sociology of health and illness, the social determinants of health, social statistics, classical sociological theory, and social capital and health. His interests center on the sociology of health and illness--particularly how social conditions contribute to the physical and mental health of adults, children, and

the communities in which they live. His related interests are in social capital, social networks, theorybuilding in population health, social constructions of illness and risk, the measurement of community social environments, and the application of mixed methods to health research.

Professor Taylor is an Associate Professor of Sociology at Florida State University.

He has been an active member of the SSSP Mental Health Division as well as the ASA mental health section. His

primary areas of research interest include the sociology of mental health and psychiatric epidemiology; ethnicity and health; and social stress and the stress process. He teaches medical sociology, epidemiologic methods, ethnicity and health, research methods, and sport and society. 
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Call for Nominations-Greenley Award for Lifetime

Paper Competition. Papers should involve an empirical analysis, either qualitative or quantitative, dealing with any aspect of the sociology of mental health. To be eligible, a paper must have been

written during 2012 or 2013, and it may not be published or accepted for publication. Papers that were presented at a profes-

sional meeting, submitted for presentation at a professional conference, or are under review for publication are eligible. Papers must be student-authored. They may be single authored by the student or co-authored by more than one student, but may not be coauthored by a faculty member or other nonstudent. The Faculty of Arts invites applications for the position of Head of the Department of Sociology, with anticipated start date of July 1, 2013. We expect that the successful candidate will be appointed at the rank of full Professor; however, exceptional candidates at the senior Associate Professor level also will be considered. The successful candidate must have a Ph.D., a distinguished record of research preferably in any of the Department's broad areas of specialization, a strong commitment to advancing all areas of research, a demonstrated commitment to high quality teaching at the graduate and undergraduate levels, and possess a track record of successful graduate supervision. The Department is committed to international visibility, research excellence and societal impact.

The successful candidate will be expected to demonstrate vision and creativity as a leader, administrator, and advocate for the Department. The Head is responsible for recruiting and evaluating faculty, developing scholarly initiatives, and overseeing the educational programs and the financial health of the unit. For information about the Department, visit www.soci.ubc.ca. The position is subject to final budgetary approval. Salary will be commensurate with qualifications and experience. The appointment as Head is typically for a five-year term with the possibility for reappointment.

Applications should include a letter of application, curriculum vitae, a brief description of research interests, a sample of research publications, evidence of teaching effectiveness and the names and contact information of four referees, whom we may contact for confidential letters of reference. Introducing New PhD Program in Sociology at UMass Boston. The Sociology PhD Program at UMass Boston builds on the success of our MA Program in Applied Sociology and the research and scholarly accomplishments of our dynamic faculty. PhD students will complete a core set of courses in social theory and research methods and then concentrate in one of three areas: health, mental health and health care services; communities and crime; or immigration and globalization. Doctoral students may also complete requirements for a Graduate Certificate in Survey Research or a Graduate Certificate in Forensic Services. Graduate assistantships will provide doctoral students with opportunities to conduct research in collaboration with faculty and to teach classes under faculty supervision. Training and research op-

portunities will be enriched through partnerships with the Departments of Psychiatry at the University of Massachusetts Medical School and at the Harvard Medical School, with the Hannover Medical School in Germany, with UMass Boston's McCormack Graduate School of Policy and Global Studies, and with faculty in human services at Salem State University and in criminology at UMass Lowell. Coursework and research experiences will prepare students for outstanding academic careers as well as for leadership roles as applied sociologists in public and private agencies and research organizations.
